<u>At our May meeting</u> Town Manager Dana Lee spoke with us. Dana grew up in Falmouth and following in the footsteps of his father joined the Army. After discharge he went to undergraduate school and was planning to go into social work but his life took another turn. He first worked for the city of Auburn as an intern logging the capital assets of the town before being hired, at the age of 27, as town manager for Mechanic Falls in 1962. He has the distinction of having been the youngest town manager. Given one weeks "orientation", which

consisted of traveling around the town he stayed there 16 years. He first had his encounter with Tax Increment Finance District (TIFD) projects when he was hired by the town of Poland to straighten out a financial problem they were having, which he did. Then the town of Buckford asked him come there as an interim town manager. Following the graduation of his sons he looked to go to the southern part of the state and seeing the town manager job posting for Eliot he thought that our town would be a good place to live and work. He said he has found Eliot to be a great town with good people and really enjoys being part of the community. Working as town manager for various places



over the years he's seen the different ways that towns view the job of a town manager. Some Select Boards are very "hands on" and others have given him much more autonomy. In Eliot, for example, depending on the make up of the Board it has gone back and forth between the two styles. He explained that you have to be very flexible as a town manager, filling in to help other departments where needed and you have to try and be impartial when dealing with matters that arise. He spoke about the upcoming TIFD vote and expressed that he hopes we can find a way to heal the division that this project has caused; that we have much more in common than this one issue that is keeping us apart. He praised the new **Aging in Place Committee** and hopes the citizens will support the work that they are doing. They have some fine people with good ideas. <u>The Aging in Place Committee has a survey out that they hope ALL citizens will take the time to fill out</u>. The survey is available at the town hall or online and everyone is welcome to attend their monthly meetings.

York River Study Committee: Watershed Stewardship Plan

The York River Study Committee recently presented its draft of a Watershed Stewardship Plan to the Eliot Planning Board and gave a tour of a website where the significant data that they have collected is brought together in an interactive mapping format. The Watershed Stewardship Plan document identifies key actions that communities can take to help protect the outstanding historic, natural, and cultural resources of the York River Watershed. The stewardship objectives and key actions are intended to protect important resources for current and future generations. These recommendations have been developed over the last 18 months after extensive review of watershed data, reports and comprehensive plans, and discussions with community groups, resource experts, and watershed residents. Later this year, the Study Committee will be seeking endorsement from the four watershed communities to pursue Partnership Wild and Scenic River designation for the York River and its major tributaries in the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System Designation would provide the financial resources, technical assistance, and local administrative structure to help implement recommendations in the York River Watershed Stewardship Plan. It is hoped that a warrant article will be placed by the Select Board on the November ballot. The Study Committee invites you to review the document at their website http://www.yorkrivermaine.org/ They will also have a table at our June 12th elections so please stop by.
