first published in 1936 to aid African Americans, as they traveled in finding accommodations where they would be accepted, during this time of deep racial

discrimination. The "Whites Only" policies meant that black travelers often couldn't find safe places to eat or sleep and so-called "Sundown Towns" where blacks were banned from being out after dark, were scattered across our country. Louise and Louis Gregory, an inter-racial couple who lived here in Eliot are also included in the display. Both traveled extensively to promote Racial Amity, starting in the early 1900s. "Rock Rest," the home of the Sinclair family of Kittery



Point, was opened in the late 1930s as a summer guesthouse for African-American tourists and closed in the 1970s.

March 11 - Abenaki and Archaeology: Digging up Manchester's

Past. Millyard Museum, 200 Bedford Street,

downtown Manchester. The presence of the Merrimack River is the most important reason for the early settlement of this area, first by the Paleo-Indians, then by the Native Americans, called the Abenaki. The Manchester Historic Association has nearly 20,000 artifacts recovered from local Native American sites. This is one of the most important archaeological collections of Native American materials in New England. This collection represents every phase in the habitation timeline of the Merrimack Valley since the first known peoples arrived more than 11,000 years ago. You will




see here some fine examples of stone artifacts, some quite ancient, as well as pottery sherds and a more recent item made of quillwork and birch bark. Guided 45-minute, group tour begins at 10:30 am. 
