

August 9 & 13 Historic Building Open House Events 3 pm - 6 pm


The **Fogg House** at 116 Old Road. The restored homestead of William (1790-1859) and Betsy (Hill) Fogg was built between 1819 and 1821 and contains personal artifacts, historic book and other collections of the Fogg family. Special event on **August 13^{th:}** Dr. Anne Perry will be recreating her stage role as Sarah Jane Farmer and will be on hand to greet and talk about Sarah's life and aspirations. Sarah Jane Farmer was the founder of Green Acre.



The **#8 Schoolhouse Museum** at 67 Greenwood Street, features memorabilia from Eliot's one-room schoolhouses (1810-1940) and other Eliot history items from the Eliot Historical Society's collection.




The American Legion Post # 188, at 2 Cross Street will feature a display of artifacts related to the organization. Built in 1916, this building was originally Eliot's first firehouse. In 1961 the building was then deeded to the American Legion Post in 1965. The Legion Post was chartered in 1950.





And while you are there, you'll find the **Maine Bicentennial Display** where you can pick up historical site brochures and find all the information relating to the celebration.



The Bicentennial Time Capsule will be on display, with contributed items, at the August 14th Old Home Picnic.





Robert Perham, who passed away in January, has been honored with the Eliot Elementary School gym being named in his honor.

Born in Biddeford, Maine, Robert graduated from Portsmouth High School in 1942,

and served in the US Navy. After leaving the Navy and furthering his education, he was hired to teach 7 different classes at Eliot High School, at a salary of \$1800 per year. Robert also coached at Eliot High School and then Marshwood High School for a total of 32 years before he retired in 1982. He coached football, girls' and boys' basketball and baseball, receiving no compensation. From 1958-1962 his girls' basketball team set a national record with 78 consecutive wins! Their trophies can be seen today in the display case in the hallway. He also taught Driver Education as is remembered for having "nerves of steel"! While at Eliot High he instituted the Safety Council, Recreation Association and NIDS program. He was also instrumental in forming the Eliot Little League and built and maintained rinks at Eliot High School and in his backyard for winter skating. He was president of the Eliot PTA (now PEEPS) and helped raise funds to build a new gymnasium, in what is now Eliot Elementary School. Bob's love of U.S. History led him to go back to the high school to talk to students about his experiences in WWII, the Great Depression and his wonderful memories of peoples and places, even after his retirement. In 1970 Bob received the Fabyan Drake Award for his service to the community. Today, as you enter the gym, look above the door and you will see a new plaque honoring Mr. Perham – officially naming it the Robert Perham Gymnasium.
