
Monday, September 11 – HISTORY OF THE ELIOT PRE-SCHOOL PROGRAM This




Speaking of Cemeteries

Our newest members, **Denise Forsyth** and

Jeanne Houde, have been hard at work cleaning up the Gould Cemetery on Worster Road! Neighbors and interested in this very visable cemetery, after Jeanne learned about our program from Jan, they contacted us to see how they could help. Receiving a "thumbs up" from land owners Richard and Denise Raitt, they set









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to work cleaning the grounds and working on the stones.

After removing the brush and leaves, Jeanne and Denise cleaned the stones, using an approved cleaning product (D/2)and then prepared the stones to be re-set, by

digging around the bases and cleaning out the old mortar between the headstone and the base. The previous mortar appears to be cement, which is



not the right product for the job and does more to harm stones than help them.

While preparing for Paul Johnson and his friend Eliott to upright the slanting and fallen stones, they dug out around the base

curbings that the stones are sitting on and discovered the footstone to Nancy



Rackleff's grave, the oldest in the cemetery.

Richard Raitt happened to stop by and removed the brush for them and

suggested they check on the other side of the fence where it was reported there were other stones! These stalwart souls then began a full fledged investigation of the grounds and lo and behold they found 3 more stones!



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One appears to have a date of 1812 on it and the other 1811.

The third is blue slate, much like Nancy Rackleff's, but with no markings visable. Denise and Jeanne tell us they have





enjoyed researching and learning about the family in the process.

They are continuing to explore the grounds beyond the fence and we look forward to hearing about their further discoveries.



Brigitte's Chapel

A beautiful gift has been given to the people of Eliot by resident George Gefrich, in tribute to his late wife Brigitte Maria.

On his 11-acre homestead at 47 Heron Cove Road, George has designed and built a unique 40-seat non-denominational chapel, next to a one-acre pond and surrounded by 3 acres of gardens and sculptures, which he has dedicated as free public access, available to all.





Entered through a unique archway, down a walkway of large flagstones, all of which George designed, the chapel is built with all Vermont wood. Using no nails or screws, it is all peg and groove.

The

chapel and grounds are open to the public, free of all charges. You are invited to come for mediation, prayer, weddings, retreats, respite and family gatherings or just come and enjoy on your own or in a group. We hope you will all take a moment and stop to enjoy this most beautiful and unique space.
