

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
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Within literally minutes of our newsletter being sent out, **Mark Lyman** wrote to us and gave us the answer to the Rogers' family picture. He found the picture and others, in one of Eleanor Pearsall's scrapbooks. We had thought the serviceman in the picture might be a Rogers but he was not!

The picture was taken at the John Rogers farm on Frost Hill. Eric was able to locate the farm on the 1872 Map of York, Maine. Benjamin Franklin Rogers (1837-1901) gave his part of the home to his sister Ann Cook and most of the rest of his estate to his son John B. Rogers (1866-1960). [Book 513 Page 545] John B. Rogers married Agnes Parsons on 3 November 1895.



The serviceman is actually Roger Shorey (1924-2000) who was the father of Mrs. Kathleen Avery. Her husband, Rev. David Avery, was pastor of the First



Congregational Church of Eliot, holding the distinction of being the second longest serving pastor since the Rev. John Rogers. Rev. Avery retired after 36 years.

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Roger Emerson Shorey was the son of Clifton and Virginia Emerson Shorey. He graduated from Dover High School and lived in South Berwick and Dover before moving to the old Rogers farm. He served in the Army Air Corps and Air Force from 1942-1949. He was in the Southwest Pacific for 2 ½ years and attained the rank of Sergeant. He was a captain and charter member of the York Militia and was a

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
speaker on Colonial topics for schoolchildren and adults. A life member of the

South Berwick Rod and Gun Club, he was an expert on evaluating guns. He enjoyed lobstering and hunting and was noted for building flintlocks and cannons and collecting and repairing many types of rifles and handguns. Children: John Shorey, Kathleen Avery, Sharon Gerald, Susan O'Brien, Christine Shorey. [Newspaper Obituary]

In this other picture, from Eleanor's scrapbook, are Roger Shorey, Alex Hathaway (a hired hand) and John



Rogers. Eleanor's note says that Alex would walk from there every evening to Goodwin's Garage (Eleanor's father's business) and that her father would open the garage just for Alex so he could buy some cigarettes and candy.



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Edna Paul Fogg. The boy in the back left, in the picture above and the boy to the left of her in the picture here are my grandfather Moses N. Paul, her brother. Edna said she had to



hold his hand and practically drag him to school, talking with him all the way, as they hiked from Rosemary Corner, through the fields and over the hill, up to the #3 School on Brixham Road

There were three great aunts and one 2<sup>nd</sup> cousin that lived in my mother's

home, as she was growing up. They all were teachers in Eliot's one-room schoolhouses and in other towns as well, so I'm always coming across items

related to their life and their years teaching in Eliot. This is a little handmade book that one of them had. Perhaps she made several for her students or maybe it was used at a Methodist Church Epworthian meeting. We'll never know. From the descriptions can you name the States? - Rosanne


