<u>Silhouette</u>: An image of a person, object or scene represented as a solid shape of a single color,

usually black, its edges matching the outline of the subject.

Silhouettes were also known as SHADES.

Originated in ancient Greece, but became popular in the mid-1700's. Many silhouettists would cut a side portrait from black paper and then might adhere it to white paper, and then embellish it with added drawn lines to indicate hair or other decorations. Others draw the profile first as an outline and then paint it in. Some used some kind of tracing device to help create the image, and, yes, some probably set up a candle or some other light and traced a person's shadow.

### **SPEAKING OF CEMETERIES**

It was a "family affair" at the Stacy/Hubbard cemetery, off Goodwin Road. It had taken more than 10 months to get the day arranged! **Rosanne** joined **Karina Hilynka** and family in checking out the cemetery, on their property, this past June. The boundaries had not been delineated on any surveys but, after probing for possible other stones, a boundary was agreed upon.

John E. Frost's "Eliot Record Book" listed only inscriptions for two stones – that of James Hubbard, who died May 11, 1851, at the age of 62 and James Gowen Stacy, the son of Thomas C. and Sarah Stacy, who died Dec. 17, 1846, aged 6 years. Frost also believed that Joshua Hubbard (1744-1807) who served as a Private in the Revolutionary War and whose home passed to his nephew James Hubbard is also buried here. His recorded inscriptions and number of stones (he noted seven





without names, as well as footstones) were based on what he was able to see, back in the 1930-50 period. Frost had not done any probing, so this was the first time that it had really

been gone over. James Gowen Stacy's stone and foot stones was easily found and the FUN part

started when we probed the ground, on the chance that the broken off stone piece could be found. And find it, we did! It turned out to be that of James

Harrison Frost is laid, was brought into view, through the efforts of **Mark and Kathleen Spezia**. Obtaining the blessings of the land owners on either side, Mark and Kathleen were able to cut back the thick brush to reveal the stones that had been hidden from

passerbys and covered for, at least, the past 40 years.

Located near what was the farm of George A. Twombley, it contains the bodies of Mary, wife of Levi Bracey (d. Mar. 1, 1884, aged 95 years); Eliza Flanders (1808-1896); Mary, the widow of Nathan Flanders, who died Aug. 9, 1865, aged 89 years. 5 mos. 10 das; Nathan C. Flanders, the son of Charles and Sarah Flanders, who died Feb. 8, 1858, aged 24 years.; Eliot F. Scammon (d. 1896, aged 82 years); Sally, the widow of Nicholas Scammon who died in 1860; Sarah A. Scammon, the wife of Eliot F. Scammon, who died in 1915, aged 92 years.; and Harrison Frost.
